Case Study in Reuse Town of Saugus, MA, Middle and High School

Overview

Founded in 1629 six miles from Boston, Saugus is one of the oldest towns in the United States. The town approved a plan to consolidate its grades 5-8 middle school and grades 9-12 high school into a newly-constructed middle/high school. With nearly all new furnishings installed in the middle/high school, there were more than 5,000 pieces left behind in the two older schools.

Project management firm PMA Consultants has worked with IRN on several projects spanning a half-dozen years. PMA Project Manager Deborah Shaer engaged IRN to handle all aspects of removing, loading, placing, and shipping the Saugus school furnishings for reuse.

Implementation

The two phases of the project took place about a month apart – the high school in May, the middle school a month later. At both sites, IRN had to contend with cramped project sites, contractor, staff and student vehicles, and Boston's notoriously confused roads and chaotic traffic.

Emptying the two schools unfolded very differently. The high school cleanout was scheduled well in advance, giving IRN ample time to plan and coordinate the project. All of the high school furniture went to a single charity and destination, so it didn't matter which furnishings went onto any given trailer.

At the middle school, for various reasons the schedule was much compressed, and IRN had to react quickly to schedule labor and coordinate loading a dozen tractor-trailers. These shipments were divided among five different destinations, so IRN had to pay careful attention to each load, assuring that the shipments matched the recipients' needs. At the same time, IRN was on an inflexible timeline to empty the building so that abatement and demolition could start on schedule.

In the end, all the kinks worked out, the shipments flowed, and IRN was in and out of both schools on time and budget.

Destinations

International shipments are packed in 40-foot ocean containers. These are trucked from IRN's project site to a container port – in this case Boston – and loaded onto a scheduled ship. They are unloaded again at a destination port city, placed onto another trailer chassis, and pulled by truck to their final recipients. U.S. shipments are packed in 53-foot trailers and pulled nonstop to their recipients. In all cases, IRN's goal is to handle each item only once, and to pack each trailer with as much as it can possibly hold, in order to minimize cost and maximize the quantity shipped per dollar spent.
